# ACDC FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

### **Business Improvement Grant Program**

Since 2013, ACDC's Business Improvement (BI) grant has leveraged sales tax dollars to assist AC businesses as they invest in themselves by upgrading infrastructure, enhancing facades and parking areas, purchasing specialized equipment, and more. Funds remain in both 2021 BI grant programs:

- The **Basic**, a 50/50 reimbursable matching grant (\$1,000 max on a \$2,000+ project); **\$5,000 still available**
- The **2.0**, a 1/3-2/3 reimbursable matching grant (\$2,500 max on \$7,500+ project); **\$4,200 still available**

Applications are currently being accepted VIA MAIL ONLY. Requests are considered in the order they are received and will be awarded until all designated funds have been allotted. Contact us or visit our website for an application packet.

# **Youth Community Beautification Grant**

ACDC's Youth Beautification Grant is open! Teams of at least 3 youth (5th-11th grade) may apply for a \$500 (minimum) grant for a project that will beautify an area not on school grounds. ACDC will fund a project in each school district area in AC, for a total of 3 grants. Project examples might include landscaping, art, recreation, or general cleanup. ### **Survey of Rural Challenges**

2015-2021

Since 2015, over 1400 people have answered the Survey of Rural Challenges, created by Becky McCray and Deb Brown, co founders of SaveYour.Town. While many of us struggle to find value in articles and studies assuring us that rural America is dying (and here's why!), the results of this particular survey were refreshing because they align with the way many of us in rural America (and AC!) view our challenges.

The results showed significant disconnects between what rural people want and need, and what media, service providers, and policy-makers *think* we need. Services and assistance commonly offered to rural individuals and businesses don't seem to match up with what we say we want help with. Common themes in media coverage and policy conversations around rural communities don't line up with how we actually view reality.

# Survey of Rural Challenges (cont.)

The summary video and survey results can be found at <u>SurveyOfRuralChallenges.com</u>. But these were some of my takeaways.

- Rural America coverage by the media focuses on national political views; poverty, drugs, crime; and major blows to a community (plant closure, natural disasters). Survey responders did not indicate any of the above as top challenges.
- A common theory is that we need more jobs in our community. In the survey, five times as many people highlighted lack of available people in the workforce as a problem as those who mentioned an overall lack of jobs.
- A traditional view of small towns is that we just need more grants and outside money. Survey results showed that rural America has plenty of ideas and solutions, but the limiting factor is people (volunteers), not financial resources.
- A perception is that a lack of small business lending is a major factor in holding back rural businesses. However, survey results indicated that usable buildings are much more difficult to find than loans.

The biggest challenges reported in this survey were:

- Attitudes and behaviors that hinder progress: apathy, 'poor us' attitude, resistance to new ideas, conflict
- Population issues: loss of youth, aging population, lack of volunteers
- Lack of good employees
- Knowing how to market effectively: online competition, getting people to shop locally, keeping up with changes in marketing, etc.

I would encourage you to visit the website above and watch the video summary of the



results. If nothing else, it may help you to see that our challenges are not unique to AC. Hopefully it will give you pause and encourage you to consider ways YOU could jump in and be a part of the solution to any issues you recognize.
